SHAVUOT: WHAT DOES IT REALLY MEAN TO STUDY TORAH?

here are many ways of looking at The History of The Jewish People. For some, the constant study of The Torah unravels (as well it should) a very specific reality trough which one can experience what some, among them Rashi have called a circular continuum of time in which there is no early or late, instead, parallel realities. For others, History is simply History. Nothing more and nothing less than a collection of dates, events and circumstances informed by the specific context of the time in which events happen.

The Holy Day of Shavuot forces those of us who feel the importance of revelation, to understand our history not only as dates and times but also as a constant attempt to understand the relationship the Jewish People has had with God during different periods of Shavuot exemplifies the our existence. infancy of that relationship. It is not enough to "read The Torah", the Torah is not the type of text that you keep by your bedside and read every night before you go to sleep. It is the type of text that you struggle with, the type of text that brings out in you such a profound spiritual and intelectual experience, such that lets you understand that the power of The Torah does not lie in what we read in it but in the way in which we study it and understand it.

How does one know if we have succeeded in studying Torah or not? Is there a litmus test through which we can decide that we have actually attained great knowledge! I think it is not about how much you know but about what you do with that knowledge. And, to come full circle, understanding the Torah means to look at Jewish History through a very different set of glasses.

When we first moved to Las Vegas twenty three years ago, people at the community where I grew up were astounded! "What kind of Jewish Education will your children have there?" "What kind of Jewish life will there be for them?" I must say that looking back I don't think I could have made a better choice of where to bring my children up. The way in which my children have received The Torah here in Las Vegas, the way in which they inform and make their Jewish decisions is simply incredible. Here is the other piece of the puzzle when it comes to The Torah... You can't study alone, you can't experience it alone! You need a community, you need a partner. I remember when I went through the very interesting, stressful and highly frustrating task of helping our son Yoshua decide where he wanted to go to college. Since he was the first of our children to do this and Liz and I didn't grow up here, we had absolutely no experience. This very process taught me how important it was for him to

grow up in the midst of our community. I have written extensively on the lessons we learned from that search. For now, let us just say that I was literally "blown away" by many of the factors that informed his decision. Growing up in our USY, having had the experience of LIVING Judaism with his peers and understanding what is expected of him as a Jew really framed the way in which he looked at this very critical stage of his future. Fast forwarding many years, Yoshua became the founder and first President of The Colorado State University Association of Jewish Veterinary Students.

When we come together on Shavuot to study, to relive revelation and to find meaning in the words of God we do so not only because we are commanded to do it but because in it we seek to find the beacon that will inform our decisions as Jews. Torah Study is much more than just reading text, it is much more than just going through words as fast as we can so that we can cover them all. Torah Study should be about resetting our spirit so that together with our community we can find our place in History. Many times I see people who "snub" their own community because they feel the community is not learned enough or not as "advanced in knowledge or observance" as they would like it to be... Whomever does this misses the complete point of what it means to come together to receive God's word anew; Old and young, experts and the not so proficient, smart and not so smart alike! If we have any chance of succeeding, if we are to have an opportunity to shape our own story, we must do it together. Believe me, I never understood this better than when my son told me: "Dad, I could never study in a school where there aren't any Jews. The most important thing I ever learned at Temple Beth Sholom is that we enjoy life better when we stand in the middle of a community with the same values and ideals that you have!"

"BRITTANY ANGERS BIG-FAT LIE"

y now it's no secret that this Rabbi is a fan of rock and roll; I've spoken about the Beatles and Kiss and even the Doors before in sermons. But my favorite sub-genre of rock and roll is punk-rock. I've always loved the Ramones and the Clash, and being a teen in the early 2000's meant listening to bands like Blink 182 and my all-time favorite band, MXPX. The latter group formed in Bremerton Washington in 1992 and soon amassed a huge devoted fan-base, probably because of their humble attitudes and tight musical chops. Needless to say by the time I was in high-school, every kid with a guitar or drum kit had aspirations to be in a band as great as MXPX.

One girl in my senior English class must have been aware of the MXPX craze, because rumor soon spread that she claimed to be the cousin of the band's front-man, Mike Herrera. Brittany Angers spoke nonstop about the group, and about Mike himself; family gatherings they had together, phone conversations between the two of them, etc. For the would-be disbelievers, she even produced a photo of her and the group together, supposedly taken somewhere near Bremerton. Brittany was the ultimate MXPX superfan, and everyone wanted to be close to her—because she was supposedly close to them. Whether or not she was actually related to Mike would be impossible to prove: after all, it's not like anyone in our small town would ever actually get a chance to interact him.

Well as luck would have it, the South By Southwest music festival held annually in Austin announced that in the Spring of my senior year, they would host my favorite band at a pop-up venue off of 6th street. A group of my friends somehow convinced my dad to drive us to the concert, and when we got there before showtime—something magical happened. Behind the stage in a back alley, we spotted the band hanging out, casually waiting to go onstage. We pleaded with the bouncer to let us approach them, and before we knew it, we were actually talking to MXPX!

It was beyond surreal. I chatted with their drummer Yuri Ruley, who besides being immensely talented was also super kind. Their guitarist Tom signed all of our albums, and then Mike came over and shook our hands. "Hey Mike, we know your cousin—Brittany Angers!" I exclaimed.

He responded with a confused look and a moment of silence. "Ummm...is she from my wife's side?"

While the concert that followed was amazing, the ride home was bittersweet. Not only was it finally obvious that Brittany had made up the whole cousin thing, it was insulting that she thought that she could get away with it. She never conceived that it would be possible for anyone to fact-check her claim, but we had—and she made us look foolish in front of our idols.

The Torah notes, "Be sure your transgressions will find you out." (Numbers 32:23) Oftentimes, it's easy



to lie or exploit things or ideas we don't deem as serious. We falsely build identities or fantasies to boost our egos, or use our limited connections to make us appear noteworthy. But if Brittany Angers (not her real name) can teach us anything, it's that the world is smaller than we think—and our lies or mistruths can surely come back to haunt us.

I never confronted Brittany about her lie, but when we returned from the concert with signed autographs, she quickly dropped the cousin narrative. It soon became apparent that the whole thing was a farce--but luckily for her, we graduated two months later. Whenever an old friend brings her up now, I can't help but laugh about the whole thing.

There is still one question that bugs me though: how did she get a picture with them?



How Does Your Garden Grow?

t the beginning of the school year, Temple Beth Sholom's religious school had a goal: to build and cultivate a garden in which the students could grow their own fruits, vegetables and flowers. However, it seemed as if the odds were stacked against us. The tough desert soil seemed unyielding and the lack of rain was determined to dry out anything we planted.

However, we picked out a corner lot of our property near the soccer field and dug in-literally. The first thing we had to do was to clear out all of the rocks plant foliage that surrounded the area: shrubs, weeds-and a random piece of playground that was cemented into the ground. Our USYers donated their Sunday afternoon and their elbowgrease and before long the plot of land seemed appropriate. Next with the help of expert planter, Eli Mann, we constructed a plant bed and brought in soil that seemed promising. Using drip irrigation, we tapped into the Temple's water lines to ensure that our plants had enough to drink.

With the plant bed up and the water flowing, we were ready to begin gardening. But this was no easy task: Las Vegas winds and heat proved initially daunting. However, our students were thorough and open-minded. On Monday afternoons after a school-wide Torah study, our students would learn with Eli Mann and Rabbi Ami Monson (our fifth grade teacher) all the components of successful gardening techniques. They

dug, pulled, planted, weeded and watered through the winter and into the spring.

Their results have been nothing short of spectacular! The TBS religious school garden is now proud to host the following in our garden bed: Tomatoes, Sunflowers, Peppers, Kale, Watermelon, Cantaloupe, Peas, Beans, Sweet Potatoes, Potatoes, Roses, Radishes, Mint, and Parsley (which was used at the recent TBS seder).

Like so much in 2020, we were unsure about how our garden would end up. However, I'm happy to report that with God's help and some hard work, our Religious School garden is blooming.





